## Remembering H. Gordon Grimditch and John K. Barrall

Media Borough held a ceremony to induct H. Gordon Grimditch and John K. Barrall into the Walk of Fame on September 16, 2015. Family members and friends were joined by representatives from various community organizations and Borough officials. Reverend Nikki Passante gave the opening and closing blessings.



Mayor McMahon remarked that Mr. Grimditch was born in 1924 and lived in Media his entire life until 2010 when he moved to Bethlehem to live with his daughter. He served in the China Burma India Theater during World War II in the U.S. Army. Gordon served the Borough of Media for more than 20 years as a Code Enforcement Officer and Borough Secretary. Mr. Grimditch's daughters spoke about their father and how proud he was to be part of this community. Many attendees mentioned how Mr. Grimditch would sit on his porch each day and wave and chat with everyone who went by.

Mayor McMahon remarked that John K. Barrall was born in 1902 and spent more than 40 years in Media schools and more than 50 years in church and civic work. He served as principal of Media High School from 1941 until 1966 when Media and Rose Tree districts merged. In 1979 the Borough honored him with a John K. Barrall Day and named the athletic field in Media after him.


### Media Borough Website to be Updated

## A Message from the Police Department

School is back in session and with it comes safety concerns for our children. During the busiest times of the day- morning and afternoon rush hours- is when school buses are typically picking up and dropping off school children, children are walking to and from the schools and bus stops and after school activities are starting. School zone lights are flashing again and the speed limit in these zones is decreased to 15 mph during certain times of the day. It is important to adhere to the rules of the road in general, as well as the laws surrounding school zones and school buses.

Violating the laws surrounding schools- stopping for crossing guards crossing children, buses with flashing lights and the stop sign activated, school zones, etc.- could not only cost you money after a ticket but also cost you your license. When the red lights are activated on a school bus and you go around the bus you are violating the law- and don't think you are getting away with it because you don't see a police car nearby. The bus driver will write down your license plate and turn the information over to the police for a ticket to be issued. The purposes of these laws are not to inconvenience the motoring public on their way to work, but instead to protect the children and pedestrians during busy travel hours.

By far the biggest complaint by crossing guards is the inattentiveness of drivers during the morning and afternoon hours. Our crossing guards put their lives on the line stepping out into traffic to cross our children, and often times are met by drivers who are not paying attention to the road and their surroundings. Many times the drivers are texting or talking on their cell phones, or are just plain impatient. These drivers typically go through stop signs, go around the crossing guards or other pedestrians/children in the crosswalk, or speed through the school zones. Let us slow down and wait to return that text message when we arrive at our destination- a text message is not worth a child losing their life.

## Keeping Food Safe During an Emergency



Did you know that a flood, fire, national disaster, or the loss of power from high winds, snow, or ice could jeopardize the safety of your food? Knowing how to determine if food is safe and how to keep food safe will help minimize the potential loss of food and reduce the risk of foodborne illness.

Always keep meat, poultry, fish, and eggs refrigerated at or below 40 °F and frozen food at or below 0 °F. This may be difficult when the power is out.

Keep the refrigerator and freezer doors closed as much as possible to maintain the cold temperature. The refrigerator will keep food safely cold for about 4 hours if it is unopened. A full freezer will hold the temperature for approximately 48 hours (24 hours if it is half full) if the door remains closed. Obtain dry or block ice to keep your refrigerator as cold as possible if the power is going to be out for a prolonged period of time. Fifty pounds of dry ice should hold an 18-cubic foot full freezer for 2 days. Plan ahead and know where dry ice and block ice can be purchased.

### **Be prepared for an emergency...**

... by having items on hand that don't require refrigeration and can be eaten cold or heated on the outdoor grill. Shelf-stable food boxed or canned milk, water, and canned goods should be part of a planned emergency food supply. Make sure you have ready-to-use baby formula for infants and pet food. Remember to use these items and replace them from time to time. Be sure to keep a hand-held can opener for an emergency.

Consider what you can do ahead of time to store your food safely in an emergency. If you live in a location that could be affected by a flood, plan your food storage on shelves that will be safely out of the way of contaminated water. Coolers are a great help for keeping food cold if the power will be out for more than 4 hours—have a couple on hand along with frozen gel packs. When your freezer is not full, keep items close together—this helps the food stay cold longer.

Digital, dial, or instant-read food thermometers and appliance thermometers will help you know if the food is at safe temperatures. Keep appliance thermometers in the refrigerator and freezer at all times. When the power is out, an appliance thermometer will always indicate the temperature in the refrigerator and freezer no matter how long the power has been out. The refrigerator temperature should be 40 °F or below; the freezer, 0 °F or lower. If you're not sure a particular food is cold enough, take its temperature with a food thermometer.

## October is National Bullying Prevention Month

There are many warning signs that may indicate that someone is affected by bullying—either being bullied or bullying others. Recognizing the warning signs is an important first step in taking action against bullying. Not all children who are bullied or are bullying others ask for help.

It is important to talk with children who show signs of being bullied or bullying others. These warning signs can also point to other issues or problems, such as depression or substance abuse. Talking to the child can help identify the root of the problem.

### Signs a Child is Being Bullied

Look for changes in the child. However, be aware that not all children who are bullied exhibit warning signs.

Some signs that may point to a bullying problem are:

Unexplainable injuries

Lost or destroyed clothing, books, electronics, or jewelry

Frequent headaches or stomach aches, feeling sick or faking illness

Changes in eating habits, like suddenly skipping meals or binge eating. Kids may come home from school hungry because they did not eat lunch.

Difficulty sleeping or frequent nightmares

Declining grades, loss of interest in schoolwork, or not wanting to go to school

Sudden loss of friends or avoidance of social situations

Feelings of helplessness or decreased self esteem

Self-destructive behaviors such as running away from home, harming themselves, or talking about suicide

### Signs a Child is Bullying Others

Kids may be bullying others if they:

Get into physical or verbal fights

Have friends who bully others

Are increasingly aggressive

Get sent to the principal's office or to detention frequently

Have unexplained extra money or new belongings

Blame others for their problems

Don't accept responsibility for their actions

Are competitive and worry about their reputation or popularity

# Recycling News

## Recycling Reimbursement

Media is reimbursed by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania for its recycling efforts. Our last reimbursement check was for \$30,290. The amount of the reimbursement is based on the residential and commercial recycling tonnage collected in the borough each year. Every bit of material recycled by residents and businesses helps pay for Media's recycling program and saves taxpayers money. So keep it up Media!

## Residential Recycling Schedule:

Media Borough recycles weekly. The west side of the Borough (everyone west of Jackson Street) is collected on Tuesdays. The east side of the Borough (everyone east of Jackson Street) is collected on Thursdays. If collection falls on New Year's Day, Independence Day or Christmas, the recycling will be collected the following day. All recyclables go in the bright green 32 gallon-sized Media Borough recycling container.

## Extra Green Recycling Bins Available

If you find you are recycling more than 32 gallons worth of recycling each week (as many of your neighbors do), or if you do not have a recycling bin, stop by the Media Borough Offices, second floor, Media Borough Hall 8:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m. to pick one up. The bins cost \$5.00 (free for new residents).

## What to Recycle:

Media has single stream recycling. All the different recycled materials are collected mixed together in the bin and later sorted at the ReCommunity Recycling facility (for more information see <http://www.mediaborough.com/publicworks/recycling-and-waste>). Recycled materials include:

- Glass bottles and jars (clear, green and brown)—rinse thoroughly; remove lids and neck bands
- Metal food and beverage cans (aluminum, tin, steel, bimetallic—soda, beer, pet food, soup, coffee cans, foil and foil pie tins etc.)—rinsed
- All plastics with triangle symbols #1 through #7 (including Styrofoam)—rinsed
- Paper (newspaper, magazines, catalogs, junk mail, soft cover books, old telephone books, paper bags, food boxes and office paper)
- Cardboard (corrugated and non-corrugated), including pizza boxes and milk cartons
- Aseptic packaging/Tetrapak (juice boxes, etc.)--rinsed
- Shredded paper may be placed in a clear plastic bag and set out next to your recycling bin.

**DO NOT RECYCLE:** • Plastic bags or plastic food wrap • Straws and cup lids • bottle & container caps • Plastic flatware (including "compostable" flatware) • Styrofoam or any other form of foam or plastic packaging without a numbered triangle symbol (including meat/produce trays and egg cartons) • Scrap metal • Hazardous waste • Disposable diapers • Paper towels or tissue paper • Textiles, fabric, or clothing • Ceramics, chinaware porcelain or Pyrex dishware • Books • Toys • Liquids • Mirrors • Window glass • Light bulbs • Batteries • Syringes/Needles • Computer and electronic equipment • Hard cover books • Any household item (such as toasters, cooking pots or pans, etc.) • Any plastic without a triangle & number.

**If You Miss a Curbside Collection:** Glass, cans and plastic bottles may be taken to the recycling drop-off Igloos located at Rose Tree Park and the Media Highway Department Garage off Brooke Street. The recyclables do not need to be sorted. Paper is collected at Abitibi dumpsters at Media schools and other locations (see [http://www.paperretriever.com/form/search\\_us.asp?ID=267](http://www.paperretriever.com/form/search_us.asp?ID=267)). ### Media Stormwater Project Begins

You may have noticed engineers from T & M Associates carrying out the survey work for the borough's stormwater planning project this summer. As a densely populated urban town in the Ridley and Crum Creek Watersheds dating back to the mid-1800s, Media Borough has three preconditions for significant stormwater problems: an antiquated storm sewer system, a majority of older structures built before stormwater mitigation requirements and little remaining green space for water infiltration. The stormwater that does not soak into the ground becomes surface runoff, which collects pollutants as it flows directly into Ridley and Crum Creeks or is channeled through storm sewers into Ridley Creek. Runoff also causes flooding problems at times of heavy rain. Reducing stormwater runoff and improving water quality are of key importance to Media Borough Council. The stormwater project will identify and document sources of runoff on Media Borough streets and create a plan to increase infiltration and control flooding, which will include the design of sustainable green infrastructure projects for strategic locations in the borough. The project is funded by a grant from the Growing Greener program of the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection

## Bulk Trash Pickup

Media collects bulk items the **last Wednesday of the month**. Each residential unit shall be entitled to one (1) free heavy trash pickup per calendar year. Additional heavy trash pickups are subject to a fee of \$30 per pickup. Each pickup is limited to five (5) items, with no more than two (2) large appliances. Additional large appliances will be subject to an additional fee of \$15 per large appliance. Any appliance containing freon shall be subject to an additional fee of \$15. **You must contact the Borough at least 48 hours before the pick up day to be placed on the list.**
